# From the Empty Tomb

# **Happy Easter!**

The shortest Bible narrative of the resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ is found in the Gospel according to Mark, chapter 16, verses 1–8:

- <sup>1</sup> When the Sabbath was over, Mary Magdalene, Mary the mother of James, and Salome bought spices so they might go and anoint him.
- <sup>2</sup> Very early, when the sun had risen on the first day of the week, they came to the tomb.
- <sup>3</sup> They were saying to one another, "Who will roll back the stone for us from the entrance to the tomb?"
- <sup>4</sup> When they looked up, they saw that the stone had been rolled back; it was very large.
- <sup>5</sup> On entering the tomb, they saw a young man sitting on the right side, clothed in a white robe, and they were utterly amazed.
- <sup>6</sup> He said to them, "Do not be amazed! You seek Jesus of Nazareth, the crucified. He has been raised; he is not here. Behold the place where they laid him.
- <sup>7</sup> But go and tell his disciples and Peter, 'He is going before you to Galilee; there you will see him, as he told you.'"
- <sup>8</sup> Then they went out and fled from the tomb, seized with trembling and bewilderment. They said nothing to anyone, for they were afraid.

This passage is read at the Easter Vigil Mass every three years (Year B), although the final verse is omitted. I would like to reflect on this overlooked verse.

This verse tells us that for the women who saw the empty tomb, the reality of the resurrection was so overwhelming that it was beyond human comprehension. Their frightened silence in response to the angel's message reminds us that throughout Mark's

Gospel, people frequently react to Jesus' deeds and revelations with amazement, silence, fear, and even terror (e.g., Mark 1:22; 1:27; 4:40-41; 6:50-51). The teachings and miracles of our Lord Jesus unveil the profound mystery of God's personal coming among us.

In biblical narratives, silence often follows a direct encounter with God. The women remained silent until the angel's message was passed on to the disciples – the rightful recipients of this divine revelation. Upon hearing the message that Jesus had risen (16:6) and that he would appear in Galilee (16:7), the women fled, trembling, surprised, silent, and afraid. These reactions are fitting responses to God's greatest act: the raising our Lord Jesus Christ from the dead.

The women had witnessed Jesus' death and burial. They expected to find his crucified body in the tomb. However, in a dramatic reversal, God transformed the human condition, leading both the women and us into the dawn of a new day.

The three women in the Gospel stood in awe, caught between joy and fear, unable to find words to express what they had seen. Like them, we too are invited to silently contemplate the wonderful and wondrous event of the resurrection. Our journey of faith begins at the empty tomb, time and time again. The crucified Lord Jesus is alive and goes before us. Let us follow Him.

# The 14th Anniversary of March 11 Memorial Mass for the Victims of the Great East Japan Earthquake and Prayer for Healing and Renewal



Every year, since 2012, Sendai Diocese holds a Memorial Mass at the cathedral to remember the victims of the Great East Japan Earthquake. This year, over 200 people gathered. At 2:46 p.m.,

the bell tolled, and attendees bowed in silent prayer. Bishop Edgar Gacutan presided the Mass. Concelebrants included Bishop Emeritus Tetsuo Hiraga and several priests. In his homily, Bishop Gacutan reflected on human fragility, suffering, hope, and recent events like the Ōfunato wildfires. He also shared some March 11-inspired poems he had encountered. Bishop Gacutan's message emphasized God's mercy and how challenging life experiences result in resilience and perseverance.

## **Feast of the Christian Martyrs of Sendai**

The Feast of the Christian Martyrs of Sendai, held on February 23, gathered over 200 participants despite the cold winter winds. Organized by representatives of the Fourth District of Sendai Diocese, the pilgrimage began after Mass, with many walking to the Hirose River, where the martyrs were executed 401 years ago. Bishop Edgar Gacutan led the prayers and delivered a message. In his message, he said that the martyrs must have drawn

their strength from Jesus' words, like the Beatitudes. The martyrs did not live for success, power and money because they knew that those who set aside treasure for themselves are not rich



toward God. They believed that the Lord is life's treasure, and love for neighbour the true source of gain. The words of our Lord serve like road signs for us as we make our own life journey. Our Blessed Mothers and the martyrs lead us in our journey. After a moment of reflection, representatives of the participating parish communities took turns in reciting their prayer intentions.

Photographer Jun Nakasuji shared insights on the Fukushima nuclear disaster, emphasizing its invisible dangers and the link between Tokyo's electricity use and affected areas. Inspired by filmmaker Noriaki Tsuchimoto, Nakasuji established the "3.11 & Fukushima Nuclear Disaster Legacy Art Museum." Bishop Kazuo Koda presided the Mass held after the artist's talk. In his homily, Bishop Koda urged reflection on nuclear reliance.

#### **Day 2: Radiation Lecture**

Dr. Masamichi Nishio's lecture at Sendai Cathedral addressed radiation's health effects and societal manipulation by nuclear policies. Despite



challenges, the organizing team remains committed to continuing this annual gathering and keeping alive the memory of the dreaded events of March 15, 2011.
